

Dental wellness across the entire world

Dr Linda Greenwall

Linda Greenwall established the Dental Wellness Trust in 2011 with the aim, as an ICD Fellow, of giving back to less fortunate communities. She is a specialist in restorative dentistry and prosthodontics with a multidisciplinary specialist practice in Hampstead, London. She undertakes aesthetic dentistry cases and complex tooth whitening, and is the author of several textbooks on tooth whitening.

To start the trust, she established a board of trustees and advisors and investigated the best ways to making a meaningful difference in oral health, 'Doing good is one thing, but doing the right good is essential', she says, adding: 'I consulted with professor Aubrey Sheiham, consultant in public health. He advised that the focus should be on establishing toothbrushing programmes in areas of high need, complimenting successful oral health programmes running in many countries throughout the world. I consulted also with Dr Lorna McPherson and Professor Ivor Chestnutt who established the Child Smile and Designed to Smile programmes in Scotland and Wales respectively.'

Dr Greenwall was born in Cape Town, South Africa and

so initially focussed on the poorest townships in Cape Town, namely Khayalitcha, Mfuleni and Blue Downs. Oral Health through dental wellness is the mission.

Achievements so far

Toothbrushes, toothpaste and oral health education has been provided in the UK including:

- · Homeless, Crisis at Christmas for the last four years Dental Wellness Trust has donated over 12,000 toothbrushes to this programme.
- · Oral health education has been provided for children and care home residents and their carers in north London.
- · Luton, Bedfordshire oral health education for over 1,000 children over the past three years - Megamolars and the Saving Kids Teeth campaign.
- Dental Wellness Trust has commenced a toothbrushing programme for the children in schools in Luton. The children are enjoying the programme and we are currently devising a song to learn all the parts of the teeth to clean.

In South Africa, Dental Wellness Trust has:

- · Helped 10,000 children in schools in the poorest townships
- · Provided oral health education for carers in an elderly care facility in which we have undertaken screening programmes
- · Introduced an innovative oral health programme -Educares - into nurseries and schools in Johannesburg

Dentistry looks closely at the activities of Linda Greenwall's Dental Wellness Trust

· Created a group of 33 'toothbrush mamas' who help to sustain the programmes in 370 schools in the Cape Town townships. The toothbrushes are kept on a toothbrush board that the mamas make themselves The toothbrush mamas continue to innovate the oral health programme with songs, rhymes and dances. The song 'we brighten the corner where we are' is popular with the kids and teachers.

There are many different ways to perform non-vital bleaching, but results can be disappointing if the incorrect method or an inadequate technique is used.' In 2011, Dr Linda Greenwall established the Dental Wellness Trust charity, which runs innovate oral health programmes to less fortunate communities in the townships of South Africa.

Dr Greenwall will be speaking at the British Academy of Cosmetic Dentistry's (BACD) Fifteenth Annual Conference in November, entitled 'The functional smile: start with why...'. She will be presenting a session 'Non-vital tooth bleaching and the single dark tooth'.

'The lecture will cover all the different techniques available to whitening non-vital teeth, including home bleaching and sectional bleaching of the single dark tooth,' comments Dr Greenwall. 'In many cases, the question is whether only the dark tooth should be whitened, or if all the teeth should be whitened at the same time. It's also crucial to understand the possible complications that can arise so the risks can be minimised.

'I will share the 10 most common mistakes that dentists make when performing non-vital teeth whitening. I'll discuss how to use a specially designed sectional tray and how to make a sectional bleaching tray. Finally, I hope to cover how we can encourage long-term success rates, as well as key pointers for designing and fabricating final restorations after non-vital tooth whitening is completed.

'By the end of my lecture, I hope delegates will be more confident in treating non-vital teeth successfully and predictably, with a step-by-step approach to follow when they return to practice Monday morning. I would encourage anyone with an interest in tooth whitening to attend, as it will be a unique opportunity to gain clarity on effective procedures and products.'
